3-Step Mortise & Tenon Joints

There are lots of jigs and machines on the market that make cutting mortises and tenons easier. And if you have a lot of joinery to cut, they're worth the investment. But for small projects a mortise and tenon joint can easily be cut using just two power tools, a chisel, and a file.

All this involves is boring a series of centered holes on the width of your stock (*Fig. 1*). You want them to be slightly deeper than the final length of the tenons. Then you simply clean up the cheeks of the mortise with a chisel, leaving the ends in the half-round shape.

After the mortises are cut, you can make the tenons on all the adjoining pieces. To cut them, set the fence of the table saw to the desired length for the tenons, making sure to measure from the outside of the blade (*Figs. 2 and 2a*). The trick is to use a piece of scrap the same thickness as the work piece to set the height of the blade. Make passes over both faces of the scrap, and gradually raise the blade until the thickness of the tenon fits snugly in the mortise.

Follow the same procedure to cut the shoulders of the tenon (*Figs. 3 and 3a*), carefully paring away the shoulders until it fits the mortise length. Then I use a file to round over the corners to fit the rounded ends of the mortises.

TIPS & TECHNIQUES

REMOVE WASTE BY DRILLING a SERIES OF OVERLAPPING HOLES #/8"-DIA. BIT #/8" WIDE, #/4"-DEEP MORTISE CENTERED ON STOCK CLEAN SIDES OF MORTISE WITH CHISEL CUT RABBETS ON BOTH FACES OF PIECE TO FORM TENON USE SAME FENCE SETTING TO TRIM WIDTH OF TENON.

Consumer Protection Notice No. 12 of 2011

PERMANENT BAN ON COMBUSTIBLE CANDLE HOLDERS

I, DAVID BRADBURY, Parliamentary Secretary to the Treasurer, pursuant to subsection 114(1)(a) of Schedule 2 to the *Competition and Consumer Act 2010*, **IMPOSE** a permanent ban on the goods specified below.

Particulars of Goods

Objects that are designed to hold or decorate a candle, which when subjected to flame or heat emanating from a candle being so held or decorated, ignite and continue to flame for a period of five seconds or more after ignition.

Note: Goods subject to this Notice and which fail to comply may be subject to compulsory recall.

Competition and Consumer Act 2010

Permanent ban on combustible candle holders

Background

Prior to 1 January 2011, a notice declaring goods to be unsafe was made pursuant to subsection 65C(5) of the *Trade Practices Act 1974* (TPA) in relation to combustible candle holders.

The *Trade Practices Amendment (Australian Consumer Law) Act (No.2) 2010* together with the *Trade Practices Amendment (Australian Consumer Law) Act (No.1) 2010*, amended the TPA to implement a new national consumer law regime known as the Australian Consumer Law (ACL).

The TPA was renamed the *Competition and Consumer Act 2010* (CCA) on 1 January 2011. The ACL forms Schedule 2 to the CCA.

Schedule 7 of the *Trade Practices Amendment (Australian Consumer Law) Act (No.2) 2010* sets out the transitional matters relating to the commencement of the ACL. Item 2 of Schedule 7 provides that a notice under subsection 65C(5) of the TPA that was in force immediately before the commencement of the ACL takes effect 'as if' it were an interim ban imposed under section 109 of Schedule 2 to the CCA, starting on the day of commencement (1 January 2011). Therefore, an interim ban on combustible candle holders came into force on

1 January 2011. An interim ban under the ACL exists for a period of 60 days and is able to be extended on two separate occasions by a period of 30 days.

Subsection 114(1) of Schedule 2 to the CCA provides that the Commonwealth Minister may impose a permanent ban on consumer goods of a particular kind if an interim ban exists for those goods, or it appears to the Commonwealth Minister that consumer goods of that kind will or may cause injury to any person or a reasonably foreseeable use (including misuse) of consumer goods will or may cause injury to any person. A permanent ban on combustible candle holders is imposed pursuant to subsection 114(1)(a) of Schedule 2 to the CCA.

Permanent ban on combustible candle holders

Combustible candle holders can be a fire risk if they catch on fire and remain on fire for more than five seconds. The purpose of the permanent ban on these goods is to ensure ongoing consumer safety by prohibiting the supply of combustible candle holders. Hazards associated with these products include burns, serious injury or death if the candle holder or decoration catches alight and causes a fire.

Under the CCA, a permanent ban on combustible candle holders is a legislative instrument for the purposes of the *Legislative Instruments Act 2003* (LIA). For the purposes of section 17 of the LIA, consultation has been undertaken both at the time the notice was made under subsection 65C(5) of the TPA and also in January 2011 when the proposed ban notice was published on the internet in accordance with subsection 132(3) of Part XI to the CCA. There are no known suppliers of these banned goods.

A week or so ago Current Affair did a documentary on frozen vegetables imported from New Zealand. As it turns out if it is a Coles or Woolies home brand there is a more than good chance that the product has come from China. Products made by McCain's, Birdseye and other supposed reputable companies from New Zealand are now purchasing vegetable products from China and selling that product under their name.

Basically, check where it is produced by the comments on the back of the pack and if it says produced from New Zealand and Imported product it has Chinese vegetables in it. Put it back on the shelf. I would even go as far as to say even if it has product of New Zealand I would be suspect about where those vegies in that pack come from. I suppose to play it safe unless it has been grown and packed in Australia stay away from it unless you don't mind digesting poisons.

Learn from BARCODES

Please Remember.....the Australian barcode prefix is 93

PLEASE NOTE - if you love Australian produce and the thought of keeping jobs here, AND you like to eat healthy foods and buy quality products, then please read on. Please also note the Australian barcode prefix is 93.

DANGEROUS IMPORTED FOODS

There are no food inspection regulations of foods grown or processed in China , Vietnam , Hong Kong or Thailand .

Other world countries are scared of China making 'black hearted goods', but can you differentiate which one is made in Australia , the USA , Philippines , Taiwan or China ? For your Information ... the first 3 digits of the barcode is the country code where-in the product was made.

Example: all barcodes that start with 690; 691 through to 695 are all MADE IN CHINA.

4 71 is Made in Taiwan .

This is our right to know, but our governments and related departments never educate the public, therefore we have to EDUCATE OURSELVES.

Nowadays, Chinese businessmen know that consumers do not prefer products 'made in china', so they

don't show from which country it is made. However, you may now refer to the barcode.

Remember, if the first 3 digits are 690 through to 695, then it is Made in China . Don't forget, Hong Kong is now China , too.

DO NOT BUY FOOD PROCESSED IN CHINA , HONG KONG , VIETNAM or THAILAND !!! Remember, there are no food inspection regulations!!!

WATCH WHAT YOU BUY. ESPECIALLY 'HIGHLINER' FISH PRODUCTS; all come from China , even though the box says 'product of Canada ', it is from China and '**processed**' in Canada , that is, only the coating is added and packaged in Canada. The fish are raised in pens using chemicals that are banned in Canada as cancer causing but legal in China . This was exposed on CBC TV's 'Marketplace'.

Please think before buying anything from China .

Avoid buying all processed food packaged in China ...Anything goes! We just don't know what else is in those packages. Unlike the United States and CANADA (and Australia , Germany , France , Italy , Great Britain et al) China does not have laws regulating food processing.

Basically, do not buy any processed food from China . This includes Hong Kong. MANY companies are using a Hong Kong address to avoid this type of image reputation.
